

HOMEWORK POLICY

Rationale

Homework helps students by:

- complementing and reinforcing classroom learning
- fostering good lifelong learning and study habits
- providing an opportunity for students to become responsible for their own learning
- developing self-regulation processes such as goal-setting, self-efficacy, self-reflection and time management
- supporting partnerships with parents by connecting families with the learning of their children

Purpose

- To ensure the school develops a homework policy in consultation with their school community (including the Principal, teachers, School Council, parents/carers and students) and that the policy is communicated to all parents.
- To ensure the school sets homework that supports educational requirements.
- To increase parent awareness to develop and strengthen the home-school relationship.
- To develop study habits, time management skills and to foster self-discipline.
- To ensure that Antonio Park Primary School complies with DET policy and guidelines.

Schools can support students by:

- fostering lifelong learning and connecting families with the learning of their children, as part of a comprehensive and balanced curriculum within Victorian schools
- ensuring the school's homework policy is relevant to the needs of students
- advising parents/carers of homework expectations at the beginning of the school year and provide them with a copy of the homework policy
- encouraging parents/carers of early primary school aged children to read to and with their children for enjoyment
- ensuring that upper primary and secondary school students use homework diaries to provide a regular communication between parents and the school. Diaries may be electronic.

Teachers can support students by:

- equipping students with the skills to solve problems
- encouraging real-life problem solving, logical thinking, creativity and imagination
- setting varied, challenging and meaningful tasks related to class work to suit the students' learning needs
- giving students enough time to complete homework, considering home obligations and extracurricular activities
- assessing homework and providing timely and practical feedback and support
- helping students develop organisational and time-management skills
- ensuring parents/carers are aware of the school's homework policy
- developing strategies within the school to support parents/carers becoming active partners in homework.
- offering a wide range of opportunities for families to engage in their children's learning.

Parents can support students by:

- developing a positive and productive approach to homework
- ensuring there is a balance between the time spent on homework and recreational activities
- reading to them, talking with them and involving them in learning opportunities during everyday household routines and physical activity
- talking to teachers about any concerns they have about the homework
- attending the school events, productions or displays their child is involved in
- ensuring upper primary and secondary students keep a homework diary
- discussing homework with their child in their first language, if English is not the main language spoken at home, and linking it to previous experiences
- linking homework and other learning activities to the families' culture, history and language, relevant services, clubs, associations and community groups.

Students can take responsibility for their own learning by:

- being aware of the school's homework policy
- discussing homework expectations with their parents/carers
- accepting responsibility for the completion of homework tasks within set time frames
- following up on comments made by teachers
- seeking assistance when difficulties arise
- organising their time to manage home obligations, participation in physical activity and sports, recreational and cultural activities and part-time employment.

Implementation

- A copy of this homework policy will be available on the Antonio Park PS website.
- Homework should be purposeful, and relevant to class work. It is designed to reinforce concepts taught in class, as well as allow students to build other skills related to class work.
- The school will follow up with parents/carers if a student regularly fails to complete homework.
- Teachers will consider the individual circumstances of students and families with homework expectations.
- Teachers will inform parents of specific homework requirements and expectations at an information evening at the beginning of each year. Students will be reminded regularly of homework requirements for their class.
- Teachers will monitor the completion of homework.
- Grades 3 6 teachers will assess homework and provide feedback to students, either online or in student homework book.
- The school will work with parents/carers to build strong homework routines from Foundation to Year 2
- Homework will be assigned within the following general framework as it applies to a primary school.

Homework should:

- be appropriate to the student's skill level and age
- be purposeful, meaningful and relevant to the curriculum
- be interesting, challenging and when appropriate open ended
- be assessed by teachers with feedback and support provided
- be balanced with a range of recreational, social and cultural activities
- encourage parents to partner with teachers in their child's education

Homework should, where relevant, be tailored to individual student needs, and provide opportunities for students to apply new knowledge or to review, revise and reinforce newly acquired skills, such as:

- reading
- writing
- researching
- exploring

- · making or designing
- viewing
- investigating

Homework for students in the early years (Foundation – Year 2) could be more informal. In addition to prescribed homework, parents/carers and students may seek extra homework

Foundation – Year 4

Homework should:

- Mainly consist of daily reading to, with and by parents/carers or older siblings.
- Enable the extension of class work by practising skills or gathering extra information or materials in an enjoyable way.
- In Years 3 & 4 may include multiplication facts and spelling.
- Generally not exceed 40 minutes each day, inclusive of 20 minutes Reading.
- Not be set for holidays or weekends but can be done on weekends if this suits the family.
- Unfinished class work may also be included as a homework task.

Years 5 & 6

Homework should:

- include daily independent reading, multiplication facts & spelling.
- If relevant, include extension of class work, projects and assignments, essays and research or other tasks linked to class work.
- Allotted homework time is flexible and should not exceed 3 hours each week if managed efficiently

Evaluation:

Appendix

- As part of a comprehensive and balanced curriculum within Victorian schools, homework is one way
 of supporting and fostering life-long learning and connecting families with the learning of their
 children.
- DET guidelines provide information about fostering good life-long learning and study habits, the importance of administering level-appropriate homework to students, and the different types of homework that may be undertaken in schools
- Schools must have a documented approach to homework which considers the personal and developmental needs of students.
- The setting of homework needs to take into consideration the need for students to have a balanced lifestyle. This includes sufficient time for family, sport and recreation, cultural pursuits and employment where appropriate.
- Implementation of good homework policy:
 - · Involves communication between teachers; between teachers and students and parents/carers
 - · relates homework activity to what is taught in the classroom
 - · sets up an element of challenge in the homework to be set
 - · is based on individualised homework activities/plans, aligned with individualised learning styles and abilities
 - · links homework activities with prompt, appropriate assessment and feedback.
- The school homework approach should be informed by a shared understanding and be regularly
 monitored through feedback from teachers, students, parents/carers and the School Council as
 appropriate.
- It is not necessary to assign large amounts of homework; however, it is important that homework
 provides students with opportunities to practise skills, review content and deepen understanding of
 concepts learned. Homework and practice can also help students to develop self-regulation
 processes, such as time management and study skills.

Value of Homework

The current evidence and research shows that the quality of homework assigned is likely to be more important than the quantity. Research has established that homework has a positive effect on learning, particularly at the middle and secondary school levels (Xu, 2010; Zimmerman & Kitsantas, 2005). Although homework's effectiveness has been challenged by educators, parents, and students (Kohn, 2006), it continues to be an important educational supplement used by most teachers to enhance the learning experience of their students (Patall, Cooper, & Wynn, 2010). Overall, the effectiveness of homework is enhanced by providing students with choices among homework tasks, which will result in higher motivational and performance outcomes, students' autonomy, and intrinsic motivation (Patall et al., 2010).
